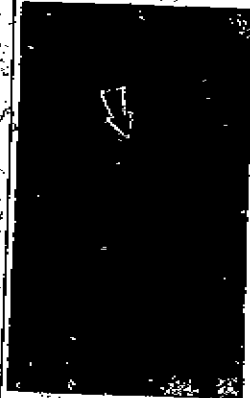

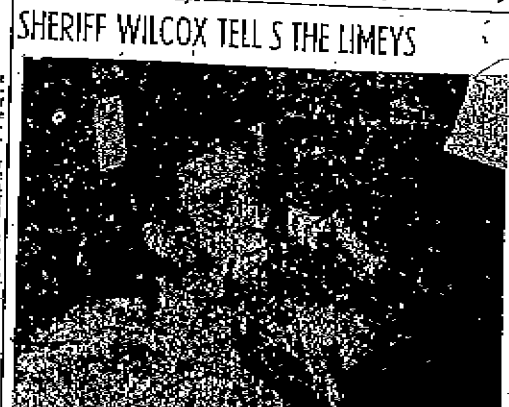

Russian Minister Says Military Men Are Causing Trouble

LAKE SUCCESS, (AP)—Russia late yesterday charged that the situation in Greece was the result of American and British interference and demanded that the United Nations order foreign military personnel off Greek soil.

The Soviet Union also called for U.N. supervision of all economic aid to Greece in a renewed attempt to place the American program of direct support under international control.

"Direct intervention through the presence of foreign troops has been supplemented lately by the use of so-called military instructors and by supplying war equipment," Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko said in his new attack on the American aid program.

Rejecting a U. N. report blaming Soviet Balkan satellites for the Greek border disorders, Gromyko said the Greek government alone was at fault.

Gromyko put forward the Russian proposal to a majority report of a Balkan investigating commission in a 15-minute speech, one of the longest ever delivered to the security council.

He asked the council to reverse on-the-spot findings and rule Greece guilty of provoking disturbances with Yugoslavia, Albania and Bulgaria.

Gromyko said without qualification that Russia could not accept an American resolution, growing out of the commission report for establishment of a semi-permanent U. N. watch along the troubled frontiers. American delegate Warren R. Austin previously had said that nothing less than the border watch would solve the problem and Gromyko thus gave the strongest indications that he would veto the project.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The House passed yesterday a resolution authorizing publication of a document on "Fascism in Action" after a two-hour floor battle during which it was denounced as a "smoke-screen" for communists and hailed as a "danger signal" of fighting extremist activities.

The action came on a voice vote after the House refused, 124 to 113, to send the authorization proposal back to the House administration committee for further study—a move which would have probably blocked publication during this session.

The document was compiled by the Library of Congress' legislative reference service at the request of Rep. Patman (D-Tex.).

It is designed as a counterpart to a similarly prepared treatise on "Communism in Action" which was compiled last by the reference service at the request of Rep. Kirkens (D-Ill.).

The new document, never made public, deals primarily with the rise of fascism and nazism in Europe.

Under the resolution, approximately 1,500 of the documents will be prepared at government expense and distributed at about \$1 each for official distribution. It does not require Senate approval.

The debate stemmed around the merits, costs and demand for the document's publication, as well as whether fascism exists in this country and its dangers as compared with those of communism.

Flying Disk Transforms Sheriff's Office To International Newsroom

Reports of the finding of an alleged "Flying Saucer" approximately 60 miles northwest of here transformed the Chavez county sheriff's office into a full-fledged room of excitement yesterday afternoon as various news agencies from all over the world inquired as to the mysterious object.

George Wilcox, sheriff, was chained through his desk telephone to newspaper radio networks, and top officials on an international scope as the long distance wires buzzed with continuous requests for his office.

The furor started Monday when W. W. Brazel, a rancher living on the old Foster place, 25 miles southeast of Corona, New Mexico, came into the office and reported finding an object which fitted the descriptions of the flying discs.

Deputy Sheriff J. A. Clark who handled the report, immediately notified Sheriff Wilcox, who in turn turned his information over to Army authorities at RAAF.

According to Mr. Brazel, the object had the shape of a box kite. It was broken in two. The size of the alleged disc was, contrary to previous descriptions, rectangular, and measured approximately three by four feet.

Major Jesse A. Marcel of the 500th Bomb Group Intelligence, and an Army crew immediately went to the ranch and picked up the object. No member of the local sheriff's office saw the article at any time. Army sources did not divulge any description either of the outside or internal appearance of the disc.

Following the news release of the report, Sheriff Wilcox was the object of a storm of inquiries from papers in San Francisco, Boston, Los Angeles, New York, New Orleans, Baltimore, St. Louis, Denver, Albuquerque, Milwaukee, Santa Fe, Chicago, Washington, and Mexico City. The longest call came from London, England where the London Daily Mail and other newspapers desired information.

Bevin Praises Marshall Plan

LONDON, (AP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin yesterday hailed the Marshall offer as a step toward a great unity of peoples throughout the world, and declared that the door still was open for Russia to participate in a continent-wide recovery plan.

"Europe is bleeding to death; it must be stopped," Bevin declared in an address to the Wandsworth Rotary Club. "And in the stopping of it you have got to rule out any prejudices, either religious or ideological."

The secretary said that unity in Europe had appeared impossible, because of racial and historical differences and the "awful devastation" of war, until Secretary of State Marshall made his aid-Europe proposal.

Joe Massey Spots Disk Over Roswell

Another report of a flying disc seen over Roswell came in the last night at the climax of speculation over the one found near Corona, New Mexico.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Massey, 608 E. First, saw a brilliant object streaking across the sky at about 8:26 last night as they sat on the porch at their home. According to Mr. Massey, the object was approximately two to three feet across. A flaming tail seemed to be attached to it measured about ten to fifteen feet.

The article was in view for only a few seconds. It was proceeding in a northwesterly direction. Mr. Massey is connected with the Home Appliances Co. here in Roswell.

OBJECT FOUND ON FOSTER RANCH CAUSES EXCITEMENT

Special sources of the international news agency reported yesterday when a Flying Disc was reported found on the old Foster ranch, 25 miles northwest of town and 25 miles from Corona, by W. W. Brazel.

And until the Eighth Air Force headquarters in Fort Worth announced that the disc was nothing more than a weather balloon the entire U. S. and England seethed with curiosity over the report, and the Roswell telephone company was busy handling calls from everywhere in this country and several from across the sea.

However, after the remains were examined in Air Force headquarters, Brig. Gen. Roger Ramsey made the announcement that the excitement was in vain.

The object was flown from Roswell to Fort Worth by RAAF B-28 where it was identified by RAAF Officer Irving Newton of Medford, Cal., of the case weather station.

General Ramsey said that several of the balloons were released daily according to changes in the weather.

Suspended from the balloons are kites or six-sided stars covered with a shiny material such as tinfoil. These objects are traced by radar and computations from the radar reveal air currents.

The object found in New Mexico was badly damaged. It was 30 inches across but expanded greatly as the ground air force officers reported. They sometimes reach 60,000 feet. The kites and stars generally are more than five feet in diameter.

The balloon and the object kites are technically known as "weather devices," popularly known as "weather radar target."

General Ramsey said the object found in New Mexico definitely was a United States army device.

Plans to fly the object to Wright field for further investigation were cancelled.

A public relations officer said it was in his office and it probably stay right there.

General Ramsey spoke over the Fort Worth radio station (WFAA) last night after the Eighth Air Force headquarters was flooded with queries concerning the object.

In his broadcast, he said that anyone who found an object they believed to be a flying disc should contact his nearest army officer or sheriff's office.

Later, he said that the weather device could be mistaken for almost anything when seen in the air.

"I don't say these devices are what people have called discs," he said. "There is no such gadget (as the disc) known to the Army at least this far down the line."

At least this far down the line. "There were some 80 weather stations in the United States using this type of balloon."

"We use them because they can go so much higher than the eye can see," Newton explained. A radar set is employed to follow the balloon and through a process of triangulation the winds aloft are charted, he added.

The object, slugged up, Newton stated the object looks like a six-point star, is silver in appearance, and rises in the air like a kite, mounted to a 400-gram balloon.

Newton said he had sent up identical balloons to the one upon the invasion of Okinawa to determine ballistics information for heavy guns.

The weather device was flown to Fort Worth Army Air field by B-28 from Roswell Army Air field at 10 a. m. Tuesday at the command of Brig. Gen. Roger Ramsey, 8th Air Force commanding officer here.

It had been found three weeks previously by a New Mexico rancher or W. W. Brazel on his property about 85 miles northwest of Roswell, Brazel, whose ranch is 30 miles from the nearest telephone and has no radio, knew nothing about flying discs when he found the broken remains of the weather device scattered over a square mile of his land.

He bundled the water-soaked and broken wooden beams of the kite and the torn synthetic rubber remains of the balloon together and rolled it under some brush, according to Major Jesse A. Marcel, House, La. 50th Bomb Group intelligence officer at Roswell, who brought the device to FWAAF. On a trip to town at Corona, N. M., Saturday night Brazel heard the first reference to the "silver flying disks." Major Marcel related, Brazel hurried home, dug up the remnants of the kite and balloon on Sunday and Monday handed for Roswell to report his find to the sheriff's office. This resulted in a call to Roswell Army Air Field and to Major Marcel's being assigned to the case. Marcel and Brazel journeyed back to the ranch, where Marcel took the object into the custody of the

army. After Col. William H. Blanchard, 50th commanding officer, reported the incident to General Ramey, he was ordered to dispatch the object to Fort Worth Army Air Field immediately. About that time George Walsh, program director of radio station KSWB, made the announcement after receiving word from the Public Relations office at the Roswell Army Air Field. The many rumors regarding the flying disk became a reality yesterday when the intelligence office of the 50th Bomb group x x x was fortunate enough to gain possession of the disk. The public relations officer said.
